Invasives Alert

This month our focus is on Porcelainberry (*Ampelopsis brevipedunculata*), a member of the grape family. It is also called Amur Peppervine. It was originally cultivated as a landscape plant and is now a vigorous invader of open and wooded habitats where it shades out native shrubs and young trees. As it spreads, it climbs over and blankets existing plants and weakens and kills them by blocking sunlight. It can grow up to 15 feet in a single growing season. The berries range in color from pink to purple to aqua often at the same time on a single plant. Seeds are often disbursed by birds. When removing it from the landscape, it is important to do so before the berries appear to avoid spreading.

Porcelainberry has become densely established in the Town Hall gardens where it is covering several shrubs near the Town Hall and will need aggressive removal and long-term follow up to fully eradicate it.

If you are growing this in your home garden, consider removing it and replacing with American Wisteria (*Wisteria frutescens*), Virginia Creeper (*Parthenocissus quinquefolia*) or Trumpet Honeysuckle (*Lonicera sempervirens*).
