"A People's Garden: Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens"

Distinctive natural landscapes cultivated gardens and accessibility, along with a focus on education, horticulture and research, formed the basis for the master plan before the gardens opened in 2007. She will share the history, unique gardens and property, and programs that make this one of the most distinguished botanical destinations in the country.

One favorite is All About Birds produced by the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology, <www.allaboutbirds.org>.s The Cornell Lab is one of the centers for primary scientific study of birds. Every month it features in-depth about articles specific а species of birds. It is also the go-to site for bird information and identification. I can also highly recommend their bird identification phone Merlin, which allows you to carry, in your pocket, pictures, bird calls, geographical distribution and much more for over 7,500 birds.

The willows at the river's edge longed to help her, so they swept their long graceful branches into the waters to rescue the tiny kittens who had fallen into the river while chasing butterflies. The kittens gripped on tightly to their branches and were safely brought to shore. Each springtime since, goes the legend, the willow branches sprout tiny fur-like buds at their tips where the tiny kittens once clung.

#### **Exhibit "Into the Woods: From Trees to Frames"**

This special exhibit traces the steps involved in making a frame beginning with identifying individual tree species (most native to New England) to learning how our artisan woodturner David W. Graf uses the original Schwamb Mill machinery to create truly unique made-to-order oval and circular frames. It provides a fascinating look at the operations needed to produce our beautiful frames. There is a lot of information about regional tree species and Arlington's tree history. Arlington Tree Warden (and recent speaker) Tim Lecuivre provided a copy of the Tree Inventory map and other materials as well.
